

- 1. Call to Order Noting a quorum, President Barb Hultin called the meeting to order at 10:36 a.m.

5. New Business –

- a. Fall Worship Theme. The Fall Worship Theme will be "Won't You Be My Neighbor" focusing on how important it is to be a neighbor to all and helping our neighbors. There will be a sermon series, Christian outreach, extending invitations to worship. Daniel Nelson moved that we follow Pastor Joe and Pastor Amanda's recommendation of "Won't You Be My Neighbor". Beth Christianson seconded. All in favor, motion carried.
- 6. Pastor Joe's Report We have had a wonderfully busy summer! Our summer sermon series theme has been *Blessings of Everyday Life*. The summer sermon series will continue through Labor Day Weekend. This has been a busy summer with worship, baptisms, funerals and preparing for 6 weddings this fall. We had a great senior high summer trip to New Orleans to attend the ELCA youth gathering. We joined 16,000 other youth from around the world to worship, sing, serve, learn, and have fun. We have 40 youth participate with 5 adult leaders. Thank you to the congregation and community for the support. It was an amazing experience! The football season has now started, and I am finding a good balance with church and coaching. We will begin our fall programing on Sunday mornings September 8 with Rally Sunday and the annual block party. Wednesday evening programing will begin September 11 with confirmation and youth group.
- 7. Pastor Amanda's Report Vacation bible school was a success. We had 55 elementary age children attend the three-day camp and 30 pre-K and K children attend two days of camp. 10 senior high youth helped lead the camp including 7 seniors. The theme of this year's VBS was "You are God's masterpiece" Ephesians 2:10. This theme highlighted the beauty of each individual person and God's love for us all.

Over the summer I have had time to really step into my pastoral role here at OSLC. I have had several counseling meetings, marriage counseling, hospital visits, care center church services, weekly daycare chapels, as well as our normal Sunday worship.

Finally, I am planning and preparing for "rally day" and the Sunday school and confirmation season by procuring teachers, making lesson plans, and communicating plans and meetings with all involved.

On behalf of Global Health Ministries, we thank you for your personal investment in our mission to help the hands that heal throughout the world. Each day, our medical partners are able to provide lifesaving medical procedures and vital health and wellness initiatives because of your generous giving. We trust God to provide everything we need, gifts large and small, to reach the most vulnerable around the globe with God's healing presence.

Gifts in support of partners like the Antsirabe Eye Clinic in Madagascar. GHM rarely receives requests for optical items, but recently an inquiry came in from Antsirabe for two different ophthalmology instrument sets. Without these instruments, local physicians were unable to provide critically important eye surgeries for their patients. Our Director of Operations, Scott Lien, quickly realized that every one of the individual instruments for these sets had been donated and were in the warehouse. A local physician volunteered to put together complete instrument trays for each set, all in time for me to hand carry them to Madagascar on a recent trip. Dr. Raberosoa and his team were elated by this delivery! He shared, "Because of GHM, this donation will help us greatly improve our patients' surgical outcomes. Our thanks to you is sincere."

GHM responds to urgent needs like this one at faith-based Lutheran hospitals, clinics, and health promotion efforts in 13 different countries. Together, each year we partner to serve over 1,000,000 of our most vulnerable neighbors. What our Great Physician, Jesus, began is continued by thousands of our partners around the globe who bring healing and wholeness to a weary world. MEET FÉLICITÉ

Healthcare and outreach continue with courageous and committed staff in Bohong, Central African Republic (CAR), despite extremely limited resources and the constant threat of terror attacks. As recently as April 16, men were murdered in a village near Bohong, leaving wives and children destitute. Yet a handful of nurses, midwives, and support staff continue, led by Félicité, the head nurse at Bohong Health Center, a local Lutheran health outpost. From health education to perinatal care and vaccinations, they are binging life and hope to their neighbors every day. A recent 3-day visit by their sister clinic, Emmanuel Health Center in Gallo, brought out a flood of people in need. Staff saw 114 patients, performed 37 ultrasound exams and 13 surgeries in just three days. With GHM support, they hope to make visits like this a monthly routine, and to offer staff a revitalizing rotation between this challenging rural post and the larger urban center in Gallo.

From "Shall" to "Will"

Recently the Louisiana Legislature passed a law mandating that all state-funded schools and universities prominently display the Ten Commandments in classrooms and cafeterias. Alabama, Oklahoma, Texas and Utah are considering similar legislation. This initially seems benign, even beneficial. After all, in our baptismal liturgy we ask parents and sponsors to promise that they will teach the newly baptized the "Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments" (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, page 228). Martin Luther even placed the Ten Commandments first in his Small and Large Catechisms.

Clearly the Ten Commandments are an important part of our corporate and personal life.

Let's take a closer look at a Lutheran understanding of the Ten Commandments. The first use of the law is to compel civility through legal restraint and the threat of punishment. In short, it restrains the basic urge to look out for oneself at the expense of others. Without this, life would be violent and chaotic. The second use of the law is theological. The law accuses those who disobey it and makes offenders aware of their sin and the need for forgiveness. In this sense the law exposes our absolute inability to save ourselves and our complete dependence on God's free gift of grace. With this, sinners are put to death and believers are raised to new life.

There is a third use of the law spoken little about by Luther that sees the commandments as a guide for justified sinners. The reformers did not want the commandments turned into a vehicle for "works righteousness"—or worse, self-righteousness. The Lutheran understanding is that keeping the Ten Commandments doesn't make a person holy or justified—the death and resurrection of our Lord does.

One must ask to what end the Ten Commandments are being posted. The argument being made is that the Ten Commandments are a historical document. Others might argue that posting the commandments is for the moral and ethical edification of students. For Lutherans, the Ten Commandments are not a mere historical document but a holy text. The first three commandments are explicitly about God. Arguments by those who claim that the commandments serve as a foundation of law in this country, and therefore posting them doesn't counter the First Amendment of the Constitution, ignore the inherently religious content and context of these words from God.

Lutherans have a long tradition of catechetical training. Luther wrote the Small Catechism because of the woeful ignorance he found among pastors and people during his Saxon Visitation. The Small Catechism was originally intended for parents to instruct their children. Nowadays, pastors, deacons or trained lay leaders carry out this instruction for youth and adults in congregations and faith communities. The point is not a rote memorization or the posting of an ancient text to be displayed along with other historical documents, but a theological and spiritual encounter that draws us closer to God.

Besides, Lutherans (and Roman Catholics) don't number the Ten Commandments the same way that other Christian traditions do. Heaven forbid we come up with Ten Commandments merch. There would be mugs and T-shirts for the majority and a separate section for us.

The promise fulfilled by the death and resurrection of Christ—that we are a new creation—turns the Ten Commandments into promises: from something we *shall* do to something God *is* certainly going to do and that *will* be true for us.

In the fullness of time, when God is all in all, through the justifying grace of Jesus, we will have no other gods. We will not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord our God. We will remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. We will honor our father and mother. We will not murder. We will not commit adultery. We will not steal. We will not bear false witness against our neighbor. We will not covet our neighbor's house. We will not covet anything that belongs to our neighbor. This is the Lord's doing and it is marvelous in our eyes.
