

- 1. Call to Order Noting a quorum, President Barb Hultin called the meeting to order at 11:35 a.m.
- Devotions Pastor Amanda Johnson led us in devotions about shouts of joy from Job.
- **3.** Confirmation of Agenda Jason Lovas moved to accept the agenda as presented. Brad Ydstie seconded. All in favor, motion carried.

#### 4. Old Business

- a. 2025 Budget The council discussed the 2025 Budget. It will be approved at the January 2025 council meeting.
- b. Auditors Jason Lovas moved to assign Josh Opp and Jason Siegert as 2024 Auditors. Krista Longthorne seconded. All in favor, motion carried.

#### 5. New Business -

- 6. Pastor Joe's Report The fall sermon series "Won't You Be My Neighbor" was well received with an emphasis on love for the neighbor and neighborhood. The season of Advent is off to a good start. The Advent theme is "Star of Wonder" with a focus on the star leading us to Jesus. Decorating the church was scheduled for Wednesday, December 4 but was postponed a day because of weather. Thank you to everyone who helped decorate. In the past month I had two baptisms and two weddings. We also had a new member welcome open house on Tuesday, November 19 and welcomed 22 new members on New Member Sunday, November 24. I continue to stay busy with sermons, sermon prep, bible studies, hospital, home, and nursing home visits and crisis care. I continue to serve on the Eastern North Dakota Candidacy Committee and we meet on Friday, December 13 to conduct interviews. Christmas Eve services will be at 1:30 p.m. (Care Center), 3:30 & 5:30 p.m. (OSLC). I will be conducting staff annual reviews in the next month.
- 7. Pastor Amanda's Report We finished the sermon series "Won't You Be My Neighbor" with "Neighborly Connections" facilitating open table discussions, and a neighborhood potluck. We continued to receive technology training with an emphasis on the broadcast system. Sunday school children began preparations for the Christmas program. Women's Bible Study participants helped assemble 100 Advent boxes with the theme of "Star of Wonder" to go along with the Advent focus. The proceeds for the Advent boxes will go to the Rape and Abuse Crisis Center in Fargo. In addition, there were two weddings in November as well as the new member welcome.
- 8. Treasurer's Report Jason Lovas reported year-to-date expenses are exceeding income by \$29,000. Jason Lovas will research financing structures for the property at 314 West Caledonia Avenue and present them to the council at the January meeting. The balance of the media fund is \$4,162. 

#### Your Missionary in West & Central Africa

My name is Willie Langdji, and I serve as Regional Representative of the ELCA in West and Central Africa. In the past you have received newsletters from my family (Anne, Micah and Willie Langdji). We lived together as family and served in the same region, but my wife and son are living in the US right now while I continue to live in Cameroon and serve in the region.

In this newsletter I highlight aspects of the ELCA's accompaniment walk with national Lutheran churches in three countries in the West and Central African region. You will read about women's health in the Central African Republic, Partners in Mission annual meeting in Sierra Leone, Grand Canyon companion synod visit to Senegal as well as my summer vacation with family in the USA. All of this will give you a feel for how your giving to the ELCA through your congregations and your synod or directly to the ELCA transforms lives across the region.

#### Summer 2024 in the U.S.

I spent last summer in the US. It was my Home Assignment year when I was supposed to visit sponsoring congregations and share about the mission work you are engaged in the West and Central Africa region. I wasn't able to visit many of you but got the wonderful opportunity to attend the ELCA Multicultural Youth Leadership Event and Youth Gathering with Micah. It was amazing to share in the spirit of "Made to Be" with the thousands of young ELCA members and their siblings from around the globe.

Summer was also time to be with family, go hiking and camping and get rained out, as this has become my camping experience ever since I started this fun adventure in 1999 in the beautiful Badlands of North Dakota... (I don't know who ever named such a beautiful place "badlands".)

#### **Obstetric Fistula Camp in CAR**

Back to the region, I traveled to the Central African Republic (CAR) to assist the Evangelical Lutheran Church of CAR (ELC-CAR) in preparing for the first obstetric fistula camp. This is a camp where specialized medical care is provided to women who need fistula repair. An obstetric fistula is an unusual opening that forms between the vagina and another organ, such as the bladder, colon or rectum. It can result from childbirth or surgery. Women living with fistulas usually come from very poor homes and are rejected by their families and communities because they cannot keep from smelling bad or go about normal activities. Fistula repair is one of many medical services severely lacking in CAR.

The church is there for such situations and with the support of the ELCA and Mission Afrika (Danish Lutheran Mission) the ELC-CAR organized this first camp in the country. A total of 40 patients ranging in age from 14 years to 56 years were diagnosed. Many of these women had to walk over 200 km (120 miles) from their homes to pay for a motorcycle that will take them to the Emmanuel Health Center of the ELC-CAR at Gallo where the camp was held.

Of the 40 diagnosed women, 26 were operated upon by the medical team made of specialists from Cameroon, Tanzania and Australia. Time ran out to provide for the others, so another fistula camp is being planned.

Your giving to ELCA World Hunger and Lutheran Disaster Response made this camp happen. Thank you!

The women who had their fistulas repaired will return home with their dignity restored and be fully reintegrated into their communities.

While in the CAR preparing for the camp, I had an accident with a machine and sustained serious injuries to my right hand. After preliminary medical care at the Emmanuel Health Center in Gallo I returned, earlier than planned, to Cameroon where I continued treatment. I am adapting to a "new hand" with two fingers that had to be partially amputated

#### Evangelical Lutheran Church in Sierra Leone: Partners in Mission Meeting

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Sierra Leone (ELCSL) hosted its regular Partners in Mission Meeting. I could not attend but my colleague, Rev. Dr. Elitha Moyo represented the Africa Desk of the ELCA Service and Justice Home Area.

The ELCA companion synod of the ELCSL is the Northern Texas Northern Louisiana Synod and Bishop Erik Gronberg led the synod delegation to be with the siblings in Sierra Leone, rejoicing in the achievements of mission together in Sierra Leone and the US, and reflecting on future actions together. Highlights of the time in Sierra Leone include the consecration of St. Mark's chapel in Calaba Town (a suburb of Freetown) and the inauguration of the health center in the remote community of Juhuun, about 6 hours from the capital city, Freetown.

<u>Strengthening Companion Relationship Between the ELCA and the Lutheran Church of Senegal</u>
Companionship is lived out through people-to-people connections and the witness they bear to God's love for humanity through Christ. It is therefore important to add human faces to the words and actions as we live our faith.


It is in this spirit that Bishop Deborah Hutterer of the ELCA's Grand Canyon Synod led a 5- person delegation to Senegal from November 29th to December 6th. I joined this visit. It was a time to be with our siblings in Christ of the Lutheran Church of Senegal (LCS) in this 95% Muslim country where Christians and Muslims share their love for one another in their daily lives.

During the visit, the memorandum of understanding between the ELCA and the LCS was renewed during a Sunday service in the community of Mbokoutour, some 30 minutes northwest of the town of Fatick where the head office of the church is located. It was also time to witness firsthand some of the work done by the LCS and the Senegal Lutheran Development Services (SLDS) in that country. The SLDS is a national nonprofit organization that was born out of the ELCA's work in Senegal that began in the mid-70s. Today the SLDS is

run entirely by a Senegalese team made of both Christians and Muslims. It provides life-transforming services in the areas of health, education and food security in suburban and rural communities of Senegal.

I am grateful for how you walk alongside me to seek to do God's work in West and Central Africa. Thank you for prayers, support and assistance.

# Living Lutheran

### True and Lasting Joy

December 13, 2024

Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified (Luke 2:8-9).

Night. A liminal time. A time when God sends messages and messengers to mortals. A time when nocturnal predators are active. A time when, while the world is asleep, greater vigilance is required of those who keep watch.

And here are these shepherds. Except for Mary and Joseph, they were the first to learn of Jesus' birth. Shepherds figure prominently in Scripture as metaphors for faithful leaders, good kings, compassionate and brave. David was a shepherd boy called into God's service. Jesus declared himself to be the Good Shepherd. But in actuality, shepherding was hard and dangerous work, and shepherds were not considered to be among the elite in society. Shepherds were an out-of-bounds people, living outside of the city, and a little suspect. Why would the news of the birth of the king be announced to them?

What about Bethlehem? The prophet Micah called Bethlehem "one of the little clans of Judah" (Micah 5:2). Even today, Bethlehem would not be counted among the world's great cities. In 1950, Christians made up 86% of its population. Now they are under 10%. Its economy is based on tourism, which has been decimated by the current conflict. Bethlehem is in the occupied West Bank, in a war zone.

To these terrified shepherds, literally sitting in the dark outside of Bethlehem, an obscure town in an occupied province of the Roman Empire, God chose to reveal the birth of the Messiah. What on earth was God thinking? Why not in Jerusalem? Why not in Herod's palace? Why not in Rome, where the emperor claimed to be *soter*. "savior."

How does the angels' announcement of the birth of the Messiah sound to people living in obscure places far from the centers of power in indescribably difficult circumstances today? To those living in Gaza and Ukraine, in Sudan, in the homes of immigrants in this country who fear deportation? To starving children here and across the globe? How dare we wish them "Merry Christmas"?

"But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid, for see, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord'" (Luke 2:10-11). Joy. Not happiness that is transient and human-made, but joy, given by God, that is deep and strong and unshakable.



Joy is a sign of the reign of God. The root word for "joy" in Greek is the same as that for "grace." "Gift" also comes from the same root as does "thanks." All of this points to the nature of true joy. It is gift. It is grace. It is thanksgiving. Our word "eucharist," a name for Holy Communion, ties this all together in the sacrament where Jesus' body is broken for us and Jesus' blood is poured out for us. In the eucharist, Christ invades us with God's joy. We are intimately connected to the source of joy and grace in this gift.

Perhaps that is why, in the middle of the night, to terrified shepherds outside of a small town, God chose to send the angels to announce the birth of Jesus. No distraction. No interference. Just the simple, deep, profound gift of true and lasting joy. A joy that comes from God, from the essence of God, depending only on God, that no earthly power can take away.
