



Our Savior's WELCA met **Thursday, February 6, 2025** with President Sylvia Hansen presiding. As no church staff was available to lead Bible Study, the group did the Bible Study together on Luke 7:1-10 with suggestions from Pastor Amanda. *Jesus Heals the Centurion's Slave.*

Coffee was served by Hannah Work Group.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The Treasurer's report was given by Judy Doeden and approved.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Quilting project was discussed. It was noted that very few were attending and working on the project. A number of very useful donations have been made and Sharon Enger has made a grant request to Thrivent and has secured an Action Grant for the Quilting expenses of \$250. This is being spent on batting.
- The Lutheran World Relief kit project was discussed and it was noted that Jackie Lovas is arranging for the items needed and a Thrivent Action Grant was secured by Sylvia Hansen in the amount of \$250. It will be used to purchase items for the kits.

NEW BUSINESS

- LWR has declared Saturday, March 15th as National Quilting Day and suggests Congregations consider a special event be done near to that date. It was discussed we consider doing something special sometime in March and include blessing of the quilts. We may also request donations to LWR to help fund the delivery of the quilts and kits.
- It was announced that Valley Senior Services had delivered mugs as appreciation gifts for those who had delivered Senior Meals last year. They are now in the kitchen and can be picked up there.
- WELCA Spring Round-Up will be held April 26th at Stump Lake Village near Lakota from 9am-3pm. This replaces the eight Spring Cluster meetings and includes the EaND Synod. The theme is "Rooted in Hope". More information is to be coming out soon.
- Due to "Joint Theological Day" being held at Our Savior's on April 3rd, WELCA will meet in the 2nd floor lounge on that day.

I am printing a letter that I received from them, in which they talk about their work in CAR. Consider the difficulty of working under those conditions.

With USA'S freeze on foreign aide, many projects may be terminated or temporarily discontinued due to lack of funding.

We have received many reports from LWR. It has been made clear that our quilts are one of the most appreciated items LWR



provides in emergency situations. As I thought about our recent emphasis on "Who is our neighbor", we are reminded of what Jesus taught. Also, the kits are very helpful to have available. Was God working in the change made last fall to include USA in the area served? We who have a lot should be helping our neighbors in need. In His Service

Dear Sylvia,

I remember the day clearly. Twenty patients were rushed into our emergency room at the same time - the result of ongoing violence near Bangui, Central African Republic. Some had stab wounds, others gunshot wounds. Six patients needed surgery, but we only had one operating room. Decisions had to be made. Quickly.

As an emergency physician and medical advisor for Doctors Without Borders, these are the kinds of highpressure situations I train for. Amid war, deadly disease outbreaks, and natural disasters, our nearly 68,000 staff members deliver lifesaving medical care in over 70 countries worldwide. No matter how challenging the conditions, we find a way to reach people in need.

That night in Bangui, the emergency room was chaotic. I knew I had to prioritize the patients who most urgently needed attention. First, I examined a man with a stab wound to his chest. His blood oxygen was falling rapidly: from 90% to 80% and then 70%. With each breath, oxygen leaked from his lungs into his chest cavity. I had to release the pressure in his chest immediately, or he would die. I made a precise cut between his ribs, and the air escaped with a hiss. Within seconds, his condition transformed from near-death to stable.

This is the kind of rapid-response care we provide every single day. But we cannot do it without generous donors like you. Please make a gift today to help us deliver emergency medical care in conflict zones around the world. It was supporters just like you who made it possible for me and my team in Bangui to be there that night to save lives - including the man with the injured lung.

This is exactly why I became an emergency physician, and why I work for Doctors Without Borders. I wanted to make a difference in some of the most challenging and dangerous places on earth. Your support enables us to respond in moments of crisis - like when hospitals in Ukraine were preparing for war to arrive on their doorstep.

In March 2022, I helped provide mass casualty trainings to hospital staff in Lviv, Ukraine. I taught them the very same skills I used that night in the emergency room in Bangui. From the start, I could sense the strain in the room. We heard air raid sirens more and more frequently. We had to take shelter several times. We practiced assessing patients in situations where many wounded people needed medical attention at once, with the goal of saving as many lives as possible.

Just a week later, the bombing intensified, and the team in Lviv put into practice the systems we had taught them.

Crises don't wait. Whether it's Central African Republic, Yemen, or Gaza, we go wherever we're needed to save lives. Every dollar you donate now helps provide the tools we need - surgical instruments, oxygen monitors, medication, vaccines, and so much more.

Thank you for reading my letter. And thank you in advance for taking action by sending a gift today. Together, we can save so many lives.

Who Is My Neighbor?

But wanting to vindicate himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" ³⁰ Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and took off, leaving him half dead. ³¹ Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. ³² So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. ³³ But a Samaritan while traveling came upon him, and when he saw him he was moved with compassion. ³⁴ He went to him and bandaged his wounds, treating them with oil and wine. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. ³⁵ The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him, and when I come back I will repay you whatever more you spend.' ³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?'' ³⁷ He said, "The one who showed him mercy.'' Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise.'' Luke 10:29-37

An expert in the law asks Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus responds by telling the Good Samaritan parable. Interestingly, Jesus identifies the person helping, but doesn't specify the person that was injured, robbed and left on the side of the road to die.

Our neighbor is anyone and everyone in need, no matter what. Our neighbor is whoever needs mercy, compassion and support. We are called to help.

True, we can't help everyone, but Jesus isn't calling us to do that. God places the need on our hearts, in front of us, and calls us to respond with sacrificial love: our time, talents and resources. Empowered by the Holy Spirit, we care deeply, go out of our way and act to help those we can.

All of you - wonderful Quilters and Kit Makers - embody this way of living and serving. For 80 years, you have put your faith in God into action by loving and serving our neighbors, no matter how near or far. For 80 years, you have shopped for supplies, scoured thrift stores, hunted for bargains, spent countless hours sewing school bags, baby jackets, receiving blankets, making and tying quilts, and assembling all the kits.

For 80 years, your love for others has been life-changing. Since 1945, your love has grown and expanded, reaching our neighbors whether they may be across the street or across the world. Thank you for sharing God's abundant love and compassion. Until your love reaches every neighbor.

Because of your abundant hearts for service, we are thrilled to share that we have expanded our reach to neighbors in need in the United States. This means that your love will now comfort families here in the U.S. - and abroad, as they always have. In fact, LWR Quilts and Kits are already comforting those affected by Hurricanes Helene and Milton, surrounding our neighbors with the tangible love you have been sharing for 80 years.

When you make quilts and kits for neighbors in need, you are Christ's hands and feet in our broken world. Your love surrounds those experiencing war, disaster and devastation with warmth and comfort.
