## *God's Hope Holds Us*

July 18, 2025

*Return to your stronghold, O prisoners of hope (Zechariah 9:12).*

One of Jesus' resurrection appearances is told in Luke. Two who had followed Jesus were on their way to Emmaus. It was the first Easter, but they didn't know that. What the two did know, and what life had taught them, was that death was final. Their Teacher and Lord was dead. Everything they had seen and felt and experienced was ended. The vision Jesus had shown them—complete, unconditional love; healed bodies and healed relationships; new life more glorious and harmonious than Eden; the redemption of the world, the whole world, all of creation—all of it was gone.

It's a wonder that these two could pull themselves together enough to go for a walk. Many of us have experienced deep loss. I remember leaving the hospital after my father died and being bewildered that the sun was still shining, that people were going about their lives, that the world was still turning. In that moment, my world had stopped. It must have been that way for the two on the road to Emmaus. In their grief they didn't even recognize Jesus. They said, "But we had hoped ..." ([Luke 24:21](#)).

The week before Holy Week, I was in Jerusalem and the West Bank on a solidarity visit to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. The impact of the war between Israel and Hamas has been devastating. Gaza is almost completely destroyed. On Palm Sunday, the last operating hospital in Gaza was bombed. The situation in the West Bank is also dire. Tourism is a major industry in the Old City of Jerusalem, for Bethlehem and many other holy sites in Palestine. That part of the economy has come to a standstill.

Many Palestinian Christians are emigrating because they can't see a future for themselves or their children. The pressure on Arab Christianity, once a vibrant part of the Holy Land (Mitri Raheb, a Palestinian pastor, points out that the ancestors of today's Arab Christians may have been Jesus' babysitters), is intolerable. Settler violence against Palestinians is a reality. When asked what he hoped to be doing in 10 years, one high school boy we met said, "Being alive." Some people we spoke with said they no longer had hope.

There are many other places in our world and in our country that experience the same hopelessness. War, fires, earthquakes, droughts, floods, disease, corruption, isolation and political changes all contribute to a feeling of helplessness. This eats away at hope. When we were younger, we had hopes and dreams for our future, for the world's future. It's a cliché, but the possibilities did seem endless. We made plans and set goals. Like the two on the road to Emmaus, "We had hoped."

It is just at this point that Jesus spoke to the two on the road and opened up the Scriptures. What's more, he sat down to dinner with them and was made known to them in the breaking of the bread. Their hope had not been realized because their hope—our hope—is too limited to know the scope and completeness of God's hope.

God's hope for the world breathed into the creation. God's hope for God's people holds us through all our rebellions and pride. God's hope for our future is only possible in God's hope. And when we can no longer hope, God's hope holds us.

There is nothing in creation that can guarantee that our life and our future will work out exactly how we want. No matter how much we plan and struggle, there is no way that we can manage all the variables that life throws at us. That's the bad news. But it is also the good news. Our true hope lies not in our effort but in the infinite and intimate love of God in Christ.

*And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us (Romans 5:5).*


## **FUNERAL PLANNING WORKSHOP: September 17<sup>th</sup>**




1. **Call to Order** – Noting a quorum, President Daniel Nelson called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

6. **Pastor Joe's Report** – We have had a wonderfully busy summer! Our summer sermon series theme has been "Growing". The summer sermon series will continue through Sunday, August 31st. This has been a busy summer with worship, baptisms, funerals and weddings. The summer trip youth missions trip to Nashville was a great experience. We had 46 youth and 5 adults. We partnered with Bridge Ministry and First Lutheran Church of Nashville. Thank you to everyone who contributed to the success of this trip! Football season will be starting August 7th, and I will be coaching again this year. We will begin our fall programing on Sunday mornings September 7th with Rally Sunday and the annual block party. Wednesday evening programing will begin September 10th with confirmation and youth group. In the past month I have had three funerals and one wedding. I am preparing for six upcoming weddings.
7. **Pastor Amanda's Report** – The summer has been busy and full of blessings! I was lucky to participate in our synod assembly this June. There we met with colleagues, learned about the state of our synod, and made plans with our conference leaders. Additionally in June, Our Savior's had our big summer missions trip to Nashville with 46 youth in attendance. During the youth trip we served at Bridge Ministry, learned about the various justice and advocacy work at a downtown Nashville church, and had time for swimming in Percy Priest, just to name a few highlights. Free pizza Mondays have been going on all summer. We have been serving about 30 people each week and giving away backpack bags to the area youth. The volunteers and I have felt that free pizza Mondays have been a big success. The ability to literally and figuratively feed our community has been a blessing and a joy! Along with pastoral care visits, bible studies, and the summer sermon series we also held Vacation Bible School in July. During VBS we had over 75 students learn about God's creation and the ways God loves the world.

*DOCTORS WITHOUT BORDERS is at work in the Central African Republic and I just received their newsletter, which I will share with you. It describes their work with malnourished children. Imagine, if you are able, to need to leave your home and village due to violence coming there. Then hiding in the bush with your children. Often there is no food brought with and none to access in the bush. With help from agencies like Doctors Without Borders, things can turn out good. Without help, many will die.*

### **Saving Lives When Malnutrition Becomes a Medical Emergency**

Just 3% of the 20 million children suffering from severe acute malnutrition receive the lifesaving treatment they need. Doctors Without Borders medical teams do whatever it takes to break malnutrition's grip and save children's lives.

Children under two have small stomachs and specific nutritional needs. If their diets are deficient in just one of the 40 essential nutrients they require, it weakens their immune systems and their chance of dying from even a minor disease increases dramatically. *"Once a child has become malnourished, their immune system is weakened and they can't fight off infectious diseases as they would normally. So it's not just about providing food... They need to be stabilized, they need antibiotics, they need fluids. On top of all this, they need vitamins, specially formulated therapeutic milk or food, and vaccinations to protect them against further infection. All of this is what MSF (Doctors Without Borders) is able to provide."* -Jenna Broome, Emergency Medicine Consultant and DWB Doctor

Left untreated, malnutrition can quickly plunge its victims into a vicious cycle of suffering and disease— a trap that's incredibly hard to escape during crisis situations. It's at these times that Doctors Without Borders teams are needed more than ever. And thanks to donor support, we have the tools to respond immediately and save lives.

Ready-to-use therapeutic food (RUTF) - which provides all the proteins, essential fats, vitamins, and minerals kids need—has enabled Doctors Without Borders to treat malnourished children on an outpatient basis. We've also implemented the use of smartphones to collect data that allows us to shape intervention strategies based on individual community needs, and we've equipped community health workers with the training to treat moderate cases of malnutrition that do not require access to medical facilities. RUTF is the most effective way to treat malnutrition.

Today, only the most severely malnourished children—those who suffer from disease or other complications—are hospitalized and given round-the-clock intensive medical care.

In 2023, Doctors Without Borders treated 660,500 children for malnutrition and admitted 161,000 critically malnourished children to inpatient feeding programs.

Malnutrition is the single greatest threat to the world's public health, with a particularly devastating effect on young children. Around 45% of the deaths in children under five are related to malnutrition.

When conflicts erupt, natural disasters strike, or medical emergencies arise, young children are especially susceptible to becoming malnourished because they are cut off from the food and medical care necessary for healthy growth.

*"We sent mobile clinics out to reach people hiding in the bush where terrible conditions and lack of food made malnutrition a huge problem. Even though we were a small team, we saved a lot of children's lives that way."*

Being able to respond swiftly during moments of crisis with the specific treatment malnutrition demands can mean the difference between life and death for tens of thousands of children.


